ODIHR's Key Observation

ODIHR observes that the Russian Federation has not reported reliable statistics on hate crimes to ODIHR.

Official Data

In addition to the police number, a further 689 incidents of extremism were reported and are not included here. Prosecution and sentencing numbers consist mostly of "extremism" offences, which fall outside of the OSCE's definition of hate crimes.

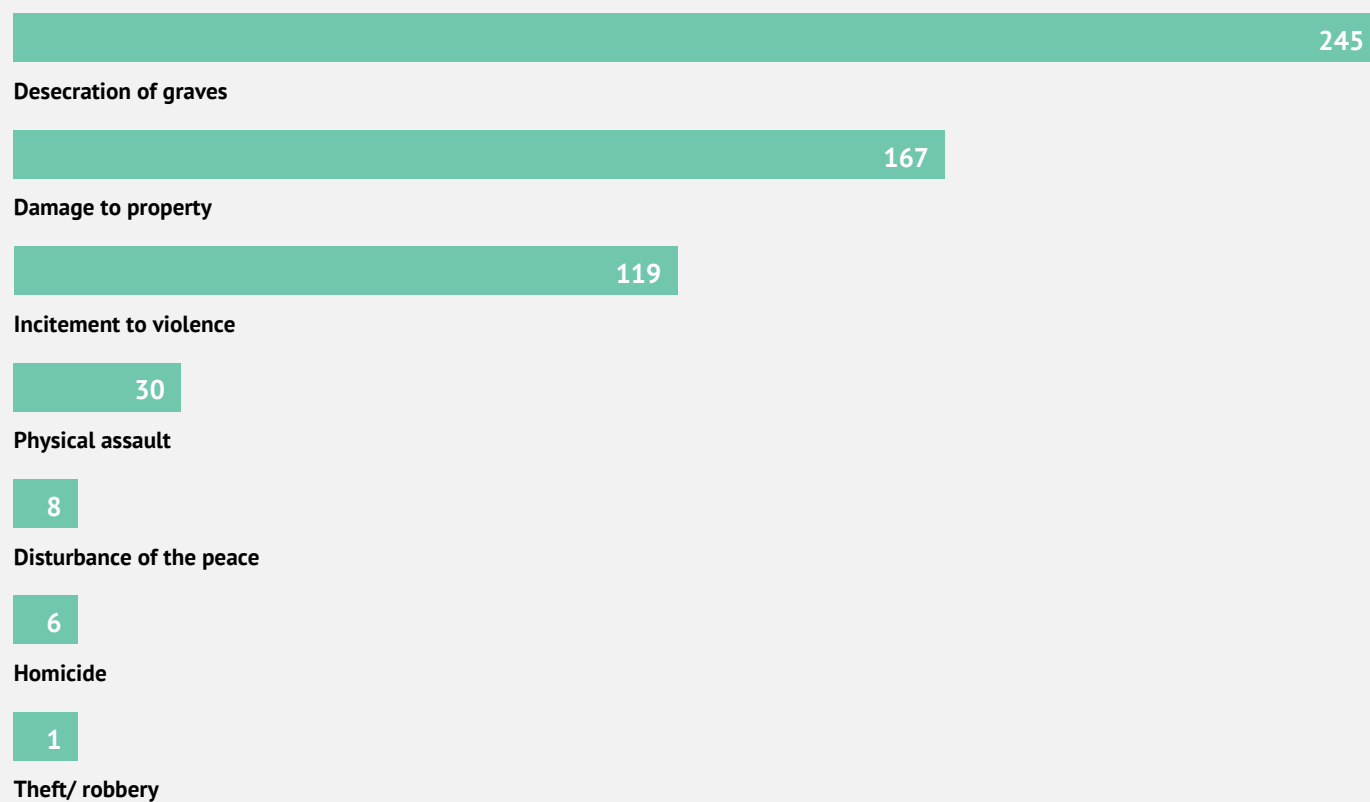

National Developments

The **Russian Parliament** amended the Criminal Code's provisions on incitement to hatred, including when committed through violence, as well as corresponding provisions in the Code of Administrative Offences, which regulates misdemeanours. In particular, the amendments establish harsher sanctions for such offences.

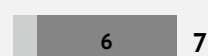
